Evaluation of the Effect of Exclusive Breastfeeding with Maternal Highly Active Antiretroviral Therapy (HAART) for 6 months on Infant HIV Infection

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#### Introduction

- According to WHO 2007, 2.5 million children HIV+.
- > 1.5 million were in sub-Saharan Africa.
- The reduction of HIV during lactation is one of the most pressing global health issues.
- Replacement feeding prevents HIV transmission during lactation.
- In resource limited settings access to replacement feed is hindered by cost, poor water quality, sanitation, cultural practices and stigma associated with not breastfeeding.

# Objectives

- Evaluation of the effect of exclusive breastfeeding with maternal HAART for 6 months on infant HIV infection.
- Compare the incidence of infant HIV infection in breastfeeding mothers and in mothers who opted for replacement feeding.

# **Study Population**

➢ Pregnant women with HIV infection, ≥ 18 years old, who started HAART at ≥ 25 weeks of gestation, attending the Health Centre of Matola.

## Methods

- > Observational prospective cohort study.
- Two arms: women who chose exclusive breastfeeding and women who opted for replacement feeding.
- > Outcome: proportion of infants with HIV infection at 6 months of life.

## Analyses

- All clinical, demographic and laboratory data will be incorporated into an integrated data management system of the DREAM program.
- Excel program for average, percentage, rate calculation and Epi info 3.5.1.
- The incidence rate of infant HIV infection at 6 months will be calculated in both groups.

- A request for approval will be submitted to the Ministry of Health and the Comunità di Sant'Egidio.
- The mothers will be informed about the study, and the risks and benefits of the two feeding options.
- Confidentiality will be respected.
