Fifteen Lao health professionals successfully conclude Reproductive Health Research training

Vientiane and Geneva; Friday, 23 April 2010

The closing ceremony was held today in the auditorium of the recently established University of Health Sciences, a leading academic institution of the Lao People's Democratic Republic. Fifteen Lao health professionals successfully concluded the Reproductive Health Research training conducted by UHS in association with the Geneva Foundation for Medical Education and Research (GFMER: a World Health Organization Collaborating Centre) with financial and technical support from the United Nations Population Fund and WHO.

The course ran from September 2009 to April 2010, ending with an exam and the presentation of three research projects which the participants intend to carry out in the next year. Research topics were all selected based on the need to improve evidence for public health programmes in Laos: they include perceptions of risk among pregnant women, recourse to abortion among adolescents, and family planning and human rights.

The text of the message from GFMER representatives addressed to the closing ceremony follows:

"On behalf of GFMER and its President, Prof. Aldo Campana, we wish you the most cordial greetings and best wishes. We are very pleased to welcome today the first group of participants to have successfully completed the training course in Research Methods in Reproductive Health.

We particularly wish to thank Prof. Sing, staff of the Faculty of Medicine and all at the University of Health Sciences, Prof. Sychareun, Dr. Molina and all the staff of the Post-graduate Institute, Dr. Douanchang, Dr. Alongkhone, Dr. Khamsay for being the bridge betzeen Geneva and Vientiane, the list is long; we also thank UNFPA particularly Madame Mariolein Coren and WHO.

GFMER humbly asks that the partners be faithful to the spirit that united us in this collaboration, we look forward to the continuity of work in the coming years."
