Ethical principles for research in human subjects

- Respect for persons
- Autonomy
- Protection of vulnerable people, confidentiality
- Beneficence
- Distributive justice
- Fairness, ensuring rights to which people are entitled







Ethical issues – information to be disclosed

- Description of research
- Risks
- Benefits
- Alternatives
- Confidentiality
- Compensation
- Contacts
- Voluntary participation







Ethical issues in research on sex, sexuality, sexual health, sexual violence

- Sensitive issues
- Subjects may feel threatened or embarrassed
- Invasion of privacy
- Confidentiality very important
- Danger of violence
- Right to choose whether to participate
- Right to withdraw from study at any time
