

Long Term Vision

PhD Research (Ecology of Internet and Early Adolescent Sexuality in Mauritius)

- Online Sexual Materials (Intended/Unintended) Digital Divide (Parents-Children)
- Curiosity + Need for Information + Attraction of the Media
- Establishment of Dating Pattern Virtual to Reality In Reality: Through Public Space to Private Space
- Lack information on various important aspects, such as on STIs, Grooming, Dating Violence, Sexual and Reproductive Health Issues (No Formal Sex Education in Mauritius)

- Mauritius Move toward a Technology-based Society Cyber Island – Investment





Figure 23: Types of Internet usage



Review: Early Adolescent Sexuality

- Very few studies (N=15), Developing Countries (N=1)
- Most studies Longitudinal
- Similarities:
 - Crucial Role of Social Environment (E.g School, Work, Family etc)
 (Bozick, 2006; Wright et al, 1990; Eggermont, 2005; Waller and DuBois, 2004; Paul et al., 2000; Whitbeck et al., 1999; Streitmatter et al., 1984, Scott-Jones and White, 1990)
 - Some early adolescents starts sexual activity before the age of 16 (Legal, social, and psychological implications)
- Main Difference:
 - amount knowledge that early adolescents have on sex, sexuality, and sexuality related concepts (Perhaps depend on sex IEC)

Review: Young People & Internet Sexuality

- Lack of Empirical Evidences (N=9)
 - The Good
 - Beneficial Medium for IEC on sexual self

(Amichai- Hamburger et al., 2002; Gross et al., 2002; Hamburger and Ben-Artzi, 2000; Kraut et al., 2002; Valkenburg et al., 2005).

- Many young people are turning to Internet for IEC on sexuality (Bay-Cheng, 2001; Kanuga and Rosenfeld, 2004)

The Bad

Exposure to Online Sexuality Explicit

(Lo and Wei, 2005; Cameron et al., 2005, Kanuga and Rosenfeld, 2004)

Psychological and emotional distress

(Lo and Wei, 2005; Lybarra et al., 2004; Beebe et al., 2004; Wolak et al., 2004; and McFarlene et al., 2002)

- Risk with Paedophiles

(Levinne, 2000; Quayle and Taylor, 2002; Wolack et al, 2002; McKenna et al., 2002)

Rationale of Study

Mauritius Economic Investment:
 Sustainable (Human factor) — Panic (L'Express, 2006 –

Under 16 years making pornographic films in schools using latest technology) -Good Case Study – Various Social, Legal, Medical, Psychological implications

- Formal Sex Education is absent Early Adolescents towards Internet for IEC on Sexuality (But!)
- Lack of Empirical Evidences (Internet for IEC on Sexuality)
- Lack of Sociological Approach to looking at Early-adolescent sexuality (Sex is social also)

The Study

Aims: Explore and identify the needs, expectations, and concerns
of early adolescents in relation to Internet-based IEC on Sexuality

Research Questions:

- 1. What are the specific needs of early Adolescents in relation to IEC on Sexuality?
- 2. What are the expectations of early adolescents in relation Internetbased Interactive IEC on sexuality?
- 3. What are the major concerns of early adolescents in relation to Internet-based Interactive IEC on sexuality?
- 4. What are the early-adolescents' perceived barriers and opportunities in using Internet-based IEC on sexuality?
- 5. How early adolescents can make and promote ethical use of Internet?

Methodology: Phase 1a

- Qualitative Method Exploratory nature Rich and In-depth Data
- Data Collections Techniques (Multiple Meth.)
- 1. Narrative Interviews
- 2. Internet-mediated Chat Room Based Interview
- 3. Focus Group Discussion
- Data Analysis: Grounded Theory Use of Atlas-ti
- Sampling: Theoretical (Saturation/Fit) But Start with a Purposively chosen diverse sample

Ethical Issues

- Informed Consent & Autonomy
 - With all stakeholders (Except Chat room- Parents Anonymity)
- Confidentiality and Data Protection
- Expert's Advice + Other adults presence (where girls – a female)
- Approval of an Ethical Board
- Several other social research guidelines and Principles (Veracity, Justice and Fairness, Beneficence)
- List of available services for early adolescents in Mauritius
